DISCUSSION

The bug delusion is an important clinical complaint of psychiatric patient. The well-known problem is namely "Ekbom syndrome [1-2]." In Ekbom syndrome, a main suffering is

from the delusion that there are bugs attacking the patient's body [1-2]. In addition, patients might also experience visual and tactile hallucinations [1-2]. In fact, the KanikaPiti appearance also includes the abnormal visualization that one will see things in yellow color. Based on this finding, it can be noted that meditation might have effect neuropsychiatric system and there must be a good control system on the meditation practice to prevent getting attack from psychiatric problem. Indeed, the misconcept and delusion is not an uncommon complication in one who deeply practice religious meditation. The good example is the delusion that oneself is an avartar of Kuan Yin goddess [3].
